We received a note the other day from Neil Carlson, of Vin Lally's GAMP group. Neil and Marcel Verstraete have been manning the GHOST launch station at Christchurch, New Zealand, for the past year or so.

"We recently had a balloon and electronics package returned to us here at Christchurch," he wrote. "Since this is the first one to be returned, I thought it would be a story for one of your 'Staff Notes.'"

We agreed, and here it is.

The latest series of GHOST balloon flights from Christchurch is at the 900-millibar (3000-foot) level. Since these flights are at such a low float altitude, Neil and Marcel have been launching them from the beach at New Brighton, where the prevailing winds carry the balloons out to sea in the general direction of

of South America, away from the high peaks of New Zealand's Southern Alps.

Ten of the eleven balloons in this series are cylinder balloons 27 feet long, designed to carry a special temperature-measuring electronics package. However, the first flight in the series was a bullet-shaped 700-mb balloon, which Marcel had modified to fly at 900 mb, carrying one of Ernie Lichfield's tried and proven sun-angle sensor packages.

This balloon was launched from the beach, but the wind changed and the balloon turned back inland, where it apparently was forced down by a storm. It was found by two children, Glenda and Paul McCormick, on their father's farm in Westerfield. Like all GHOST balloons, this one carried instructions, in English and Spanish, for the finder to contact the NCAR people at Christchurch in order to return the electronics package and receive a monetary reward. The McCormick children became the first recipients of such a reward.

Neil took the picture of Paul and Glenda holding the electronics package when he went down to examine the balloon, claim the package, and pay the reward.
