FOR IMMEDIATE RELEASEKellogg Receives Distinguished Service Award

Boulder, Colo.--Dr. William W. Kellogg, associate director of the National Center for Atmospheric Research (NCAR) here, has received the highest award that the United States Air Force can present to a civilian.

The Award for Distinguished Service by a Civilian to the United States Air Force was presented to Dr. Kellogg in Washington on March 21 by General Leo Kiley, Commander of the Air Force Office of Aerospace Research. It was awarded by Dr. Harold Brown, Secretary of the Air Force, for Dr. Kellogg's service over a period of several years as a member of the Air Force Scientific Advisory Board and as chairman of the Board's Geophysics Panel. Under Dr. Kellogg's chairmanship, the panel studied weather and other environmental problems which affect tactical air operations. Dr. Kellogg is also currently serving as a member of the Scientific Advisory Group for the Office of Aerospace Research.

Dr. Kellogg is a graduate of Yale University and holds the doctorate in meteorology from the University of California at Los Angeles. From 1941-46 he served as a pilot-weather officer in the Air Force. Before joining NCAR, he headed the Planetary Sciences Department at the RAND Corporation. He is now director of the NCAR Laboratory of Atmospheric Sciences and an associate director of NCAR.

Dr. Kellogg is a professional member of the American Meteorological Society, and served as vice president of the Society in 1967. He is a fellow of the American Geophysical Union, a senior member of the American Institute of Aeronautics and Astronautics, and a member of the American Astronomical Society and the Society of Sigma Xi.
