This photograph shows a pair of Georgians. On the right is Dr. G. K. Sulakvelidze, of Georgia, USSR, and on the left (geographically, not politically) is NCAR's director, John Firor, who is a native of Georgia, USA.

Dr. Sulakvelidze, director of the High Mountain Geophysical Institute, Nalchik, USSR, heads a group of Russian scientists who are working to develop techniques for suppressing hail. Their method, very briefly, is to use radar to spot the hail-accumulation zone in a storm, then to fire anti-aircraft shells loaded with silver iodide into this region. The silver iodide serves as a nucleating agent to trigger the formation of a large number of small hailstones, using up the moisture in the cloud before it can accumulate into large hailstones.

Dr. Sulakvelidze was one of an international group of scientists who recently spent several days in Boulder discussing problems of cloud physics and atmospheric chemistry with scientists at NCAR and ESSA. The group also included Dr. Keith Bigg of Australia and Dr. Othmar Preining of Austria, both of whom have spent time at NCAR as scientific visitors in past years; Dr. A. E. Carte of South Africa; Dr. B. J. Mason, head of the British Meteorological Service; and Dr. Benito Kiziria, Dr. Victor Trouchine, and Dr. Vitaly Morachevsky, all of the Soviet Union.


